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

Report from the ADA house of Delegates

As the ADA House of Delegates goes, this was a relatively quiet house, but it was not with out much debate on several resolutions. The most controversial resolutions were 205 and 206 dealing with establishing a "Strategic Forecasting Committee" of the house. The rationale for this change was that the ADA learned during the COVID 19 epidemic that we needed to modernize our governance to be nimbler to be able to respond quickly to changes in the dental environment. After much debate and several amendments, both the establishment of the Committee (resolution 206) and the changes in the Bylaws (resolution 205) were approved.

Another resolution that garnered much debate and ultimately was referred back to the Council on Membership, was one to establish an "Dental Team Membership" category. California already has this category,

but it is not highly utilized by auxiliaries. I think the main concerns were that the list of benefits that they would receive was not well developed and how direct membership would work with the states that already had the category.

Several years ago, the House passed a resolution establishing "dues stabilization" which calls for regular dues increasing to keep up with inflation. In keeping with policy, the dues were set at \$600 for next year, a \$18 increase.

Resolution 411 will allow the ADA Library to archive and index articles from journals and local publications and make them searchable and kept for historical purposes. This maybe a great recruitment and retention tool for young dentists, students, residents, university professors and other researchers and editors. It could be the new google search for dental science and research. This resolution alone added \$3 to the dues increase.

Two other resolutions that may be of interest were 506 which directs the ADA to take the position that dentists should not be excluded from any federal government student loan forgiveness. This is very positive for the younger dentists with massive student debt. Also, resolution 518 directs the ADA to form a committee to develop a broad reaching strategy for improving patient protections in dental plans regulated under Employee Retirement Income Security Act (ERISA). Many of these self-funded ERISA dental plans are exempt from both federal and state regulations designed to protect consumers and increase dental plan transparency.

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There were many times over my career when I missed dental school. No, I did not miss the all night study sessions, having to mount every single crown case on an articulator, having to take full arch impressions for a single crown on tooth #30. And what was it that I valued? It was the readily available camaraderie. The lunches with my classmates where we could let off steam. Dental school is hard, and there were no protestations to the contrary. There was a feeling like we were all in it together.

It was catharsis. We could air out our grievances, release the pressure of the morning, which would allow us to carry on with the rest of the day and whatever stresses were brought our way. We were able to be vulnerable with each other, and admit that maybe, just maybe, we were not perfect. In dentistry, we seek perfection at every angle and are measured against an unattainable level of that perfection. (Pun intended) When working with patients, we must have all the answers (though as a dental student we were able to get away with not knowing it all!) And so many times, despite our best efforts and painstaking work, failure and errors do occur.

At that lunch table with Tom and Leroy, we could vent our frustrations at that morning crown that wouldn't seat after 3 hours of adjustments, that patient who no-showed for their wax-try in, having our Class 2 test case being rejected because that cariology expert who was on the clinic floor that day decided it would be better to re-mineralize it. (He was right, of course, as it was my tooth, and it still hasn't progressed in 20 years!)

Over the years I found myself in want of that feeling. When I worked as an associate, I was surrounded by other doctors, and we carried on the tradition of

the lunch time venting. It was when I became a private practice owner and the only doctor in the practice, that I became truly cognizant of the old expression, "it's lonely at the top." As much as I loved my staff, there is much that they could not understand about what it took to do what I do. And of course, struggling through the day is the last thing that our staff members, whose livelihood is directly tied to our ability to do procedures, want to hear about. I missed commiseration!

And then, on a weekend CE trip to Scottsdale, I met a few colleagues from here in San Diego who invited me to join their study group. We met once a month at a great location, looked over the modules that were available to us through the study club organization, we caught up with each other's lives. There were rules for the study club that everyone was to be kind and could share in their struggles, and this created an environment of support, of commiseration. We could be ourselves. I am grateful for my time in that study club and all the interesting stories I heard along the way. It was, in its own way, a replication of my time in dental school with my classmates.

I realize that though this option worked for me, and it may not be what everyone out there can do, whether it stems from time constraints or even an awareness that there is that option! There are many around and I'd be remiss if I tried to name them all.

Why do I discuss this at all? I know I've mentioned this before in previous editorials, but for a brief moment after retirement, I contemplated going back to school to become a marriage and family therapist. I loved the counseling aspect of dentistry and thought I would try to help other dentists who struggled. We are all

familiar with the adage that dentistry is the most suicidal profession. And I wondered over the years, usually after the not too infrequent patient would mention such a statistic, why that could be. I have seen the statistics, and though it's hard to state a reason for why our number is so high, there are certainly factors that contribute to this. I had wondered if it was a chicken and the egg scenario, where the personality types of people who pursue dentistry may be the cause. And then one day, it hit me: Dentists are lonely!

According to the National Institute on Aging, loneliness can have the same effect on our bodies as smoking 15 cigarettes a day. A day! Dentistry, far more than the other healing professions, is primarily a solitary one. Even in associateship type positions, it is rare that there are more than one doctor working together at a time. And with the stresses of our day to day lives, especially once children enter the picture, that time that we would spend nurturing our friendships and community is spent raising our family, which is as hard if not harder than doing dentistry!

I don't mean this to say that one must be devoid of human contact to feel lonely. One can be in a crowded room, surrounded by friends and family and still be lonely. What matters is connection. To be heard and understood. There is ample scientific research to back these claims, and I am happy to share them if anyone is interested. In the meantime, a google search is eye opening.

It is through finding connection with others, whether it is with fellow dentists, friends, social groups, some people find it through organized religion, others through sports groups. Whatever it is, find that outlet. Your health and wellbeing are dependent on it.



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An interview with Malieka Johnson, DDS

LET ME INTRODUCE...





Dr. Ronald Fritz

I was introduced to Dr. Ronald Fritz by Dr. Yvette Carrillo. She contacted me and expressed knowing someone really amazing for me to interview. Well, I am so glad that she made the introduction because it led me to have a soul warming and intriguing conversation with a doctor who truly has an appreciation for life and for service. I would describe Dr. Fritz as a human being with an extremely compassionate heart, a desire to not waste this life, and to make the moments count. He has completed missions in more countries than I can list in this interview. Take a few moments to learn about Dr. Fritz and get inspired to do something for others.

Where are you from originally? Where did you grow up?

I was born in Glendale, CA. We went to Barstow for a couple of years, from 6-8 years old, due to my dad being in the Army. He was the Chief Medical Officer at Camp Irwin. My Dad was drafted in the military during his 4th year of residency for general surgery in Los Angeles, 1952-1954, during the Korean conflict, and he already had four kids at that point. They moved us to Seattle for six weeks and then told my dad they needed him to get to Barstow.

Are you from a big, mediumsized, or small family?

I have four siblings, there were 5 of us, and I am 2nd in line. I have one older brother and one younger brother (also a dentist) and two sisters who are the youngest.

What was one of your favorite childhood memories or activities?

I enjoyed hiking. I had a lot of friends and we played football, baseball, tag, dodgeball. I learned to scuba dive when I was in college. I enjoyed homework. My mother would always say do your homework and then you can watch a program on TV. I enjoyed math and biology. Something our family did was go to Yosemite for summer vacation for two weeks and we would go hiking and swimming. Our dad tried to take us other places like Canada and Yellowstone but we really liked Yosemite better.

Where did you complete your undergraduate studies? What did you major in?

I went to La Sierra College, in Riverside, in 1967. I majored in biology. I ended up going to a sister institution in Walla Walla, Washington where I took marine biology and oceanography courses during the summer and was introduced to scuba diving.

What was your "aha" coming to dentistry moment? How did you choose this fine profession?

Probably about the 9th grade, I didn't like that my dad had to leave so early for surgery. He would be up and out of the house by 6am for surgery at 7am. He would have to go to the hospital after office hours to see all the patients he was taking care of and then he may have a

medical meeting after that and get home at 11 o'clock at night. I decided that wasn't for me. I wanted a little more control. The dentists I had gone to, I liked. They were nice people. All of this combined. I thought oral medicine was better than what my dad was doing.

Where did you attend dental school? What year did you graduate? Did you complete a residency?

I went to Loma Linda University (LLU) and graduated in 1972. I had a student deferment for 8 years, so I didn't get drafted into the military, but I had an offroad, almost fatal, motorcycle accident during my 2nd year, another motorcycle hit me, and I lost 2 months. I had to join the next class after all the therapy and everything else. I struggled up to the dean's office, I thought I had blown it and said is there any way I can get back into school. He said, yes, they had a plan for me, and I would join the next class but right now I needed to go home and get well. So, I have twice the number of classmates as everyone else. I wondered why my life had been saved and that's when I decided that I needed to consider doing



something to help people in the world. LLU had a program at Monument Valley where the seniors would go and work on the Navajo nation for 4-6 weeks, and it lit a fire in me, because I felt an appreciation. They appreciated us so much and I knew I needed more of this. So, I decided I would go to Africa for my mission after graduation. I was assigned to go to Kenya, in Africa, after LLU, but they couldn't get my work permit, which was the equivalent of a dental license, so I ended up at Bella Vista Hospital in Puerto Rico for three years. The blessing in that switch changed my life.

In Puerto Rico, they put me as the dental director in the hospital, I learned a lot from the nurses, operating room protocol, how to write orders, etc. My dental assistant was my interpreter and I started learning Spanish. I learned on the job and attended a grammar class every couple of weeks at the hospital. Culture shock is real, I almost left after 6 months, but I stayed another 6 months, something happened inside of me, I changed. Once a month I drove 2 hours up to a little hospital to work where they had 2 barber chairs and no dentist. They would schedule emergencies. This was in Castañer. I consider that to be the most special of experiences in all the six years. My patients found out that I was leaving and asked me not to leave. They told me, 'Please don't leave. We love you. You treat our mouth with respect.' So, I stayed another three years. I left part of my heart in Puerto Rico. Between the three years I took three-month residency at LLU to learn how to take out horizontally impacted 3rd molars. This is where I honed my skills. I came back to San Diego and joined the dental society in 1978.

What do you love most about dentistry?

What I love most about dentistry is talking to patients about their symptoms, what they want and helping them understand what we can do for them. I help with the Cura Smiles Clinic on University Avenue, and I ask patients about what they want, what do they like. I have many of the patients tell me that they have never had a dentist listen to them. When you listen to a patient, they want more of that. It's very heart warming. Tender kindness goes a long way. I also like public health education and prevention as well as the other extreme of surgical periodontal surgery and oral surgery. You can reach more people when you are educating."

Do you own your own practice? Associate? Work in public health?

I am retired. I had a general dentistry practice in Escondido for 12 years. After I sold it, I went to work in Loma Linda, they have a community clinic in San Bernardino, a part of their Social Action Community Health System. I did the surgery cases for general dentists and did





the wisdom teeth surgery for them for several years. After that I went back to North County and worked in a couple of my friends' offices for a while. Then once I got involved here in Oaxaca I finally had to retire, and that was in 2016 when I hung it up.

Are you married? Have kids?

Yes, to my wife Vicky. I have two sons and a stepson. I have one son who lives in Berkeley, CA and one who lives in Portland, OR. My stepson lives in Escondido. My younger son has my two grandkids.

What do you enjoy doing outside of dentistry? Family, Hobbies, Talents, etc.

I enjoy travel. At the end of June, we drove up to the Olympic Peninsula and stopped to see people we know. We took two different routes coming and going. At the end of July, we went to Orlando for the AGD conference and drove from Orlando down to Key West for our anniversary. We tried to go Disney and that turned into a real hassle.

What is one thing on your life bucket list that you have fulfilled and one thing yet to be fulfilled?

I have seen all the states of Mexico, all 31, and all the states of the United States except Alaska. So, Alaska is on my bucket list. Oaxaca is my favorite state in Mexico where we have a home in Puerto Escondido.

Do you volunteer in dentistry? Are you involved in the dental society or other form of organized dentistry or dental missions?

I am helping a group in Oaxaca who is trying to get a wellness center started, called The Father's House, where they will provide education classes along with periodic medical and dental care. They are fundraising and looking for land. I volunteer with Cura Smiles on University Avenue. My dental mission was in Puerto Rico after dental school. Lately I have been doing a lot of work with Flying Doctors - Los Médicos Voladores (www.flyingdocs.org). They are doing and event in Coachella on 9/24 and I will help them with that. There is a group from Imperial Valley California that comes down every January and June for 1-week. They do medical, dental and eyeglasses and go to the little villages outside the city of Puerto Escondido, Oaxaca.

I went to China in 2008 with a group from Oceanside. We were there for 2-weeks. We were first in GuangZhou and then went to Beijing. Then we went over to Xi'an and did work at a school there. We were in the biology room and all they had were lab tables, so we had the patients lie on the lab tables and we used head lamps and worked on them that way. I went to Uganda in 2011 for a 10-day mission. We worked at a school of about 400 kids. There was no dental

portable, little bit of restorative, mainly extractions. The first day was exams and we did the treatment the other days. I went to three islands in Micronesia, and we hit a storm and had to turn around and go back to Pompeii. I have worked in the Caribbean: St. Kitts and St. Vincent. I worked in Trinidad for five weeks and did hospital dentistry. I was able to do some of the oral surgery cases they were going to refer out. Let's see where else, Peru, Costa Rica and Guatemala. In Guatemala we had a 12-hour ride up to the mountains called Alta Verapaz only to find out that 90% of people spoke K'iche'. Nicaragua in 2017. I found that the more Spanish I learned the more I understood English. And the more I traveled the more I learned about myself. So, I recommend to everybody who is starting to experience burnout, I tell them I have a prescription for them. That is a minimum 7-day mission trip. It will change your whole attitude. Just ask anyone who has taken my prescription.

Yes, I am a fellow of the Academy of Dentistry International (ADI), International College of Dentists (ICD), American College of Dentists (ACD), Academy of General Dentistry (AGD), and Pierre Fauchard Academy (PFA). I joined AGD in 1977 and in 2014 they sent me a letter and congratulated me on becoming an Emeritus Fellow. ICD and ADI have several of my reports on their website.

MISSION

When I share my reports with my friends and colleagues, they say it would be interesting to others, and they send the report to ICD. They have a key that comes out every year and they printed the last report that I wrote about my mission trip to Joshua Tree, CA for veterans at the VFW post at Joshua Tree. I wrote it because I thought it was a great experience, and a lot of ICD fellows treat veterans through Operation Stand Down: They help veterans free of charge in their offices, perhaps one Veteran a month or so. I write the reports for me to remember places, names, what we did, and to encourage others to help out." Also, I volunteer as a member of the Society's Well Being Committee for the last 20 years, helping our colleagues, both members and nonmembers.

Do people ever tell you that you look like someone famous?

Yes, not very many people say that because I rearranged my face in 1969 because of my accident. But there was a guy name Jack Palance who was in City Slickers. He was on a program once and was challenged to do a one-armed pushup at age 73. People told me over the years that I looked like him. I didn't look like him before, but I guess I do now.

What is one of your favorite quotes or do you have a life quote?

Yes. Well, I always think about the golden rule, probably every day, as far as the way I try to lead my life. I have a life filled with a lot of gratitude because my life was saved, giving me the opportunity to serve others. There is a quote that I sometimes used in my reports; 'I don't know what your destiny will be, but one thing I know: the only ones among you who will be really happy are those who will have sought and found how to serve.' — Albert Schweitzer. He is a physician who did mission work.



Social Media as a Social Outlet

During my time in dental school, I will be the first to admit that I looked at social media as a distraction, prime source of FOMO (fear of missing out), and a source of self-esteemkilling comparisons. While I was nose-deep in my studies I had no time and no discipline to balance a social media page along with my studies. I was, as they say, "off the grid." Fast forward to residency: One day after clinic, my co-residents gave me a glimpse into the social media world. Scrolling through their profiles, I noticed there were dental photos, influencers, and many, many hashtags. I initially scoffed at the idea of rejoining social media, but I was consistently encouraged by close friends to share my story with other people outside of my immediate surroundings. And so, my social media resurgence began.
